# ANSWER SHEET: TEST YOUR KNOWLEDGE OF COLONS

#### 1. CORRECT THE SENTENCES

- 1. **Corrected:** She brought all the ingredients: flour, sugar, butter, and eggs and started baking. (*The colon is fine, but the comma after "eggs" should be removed.*)
- 2. **Corrected:** There's one thing I can't stand: loud noises, particularly in the early morning. *(The colon is correctly placed.)*
- 3. **Corrected:** I didn't know what to expect from him: but I was certain he had a hidden agenda. (*No colon needed here. Instead, "but" should begin the second part of the sentence.*)
- 4. **Corrected:** The meeting will cover several important topics: budgeting, deadlines, and new team roles. (*Correct use of the colon.*)
- 5. **Corrected:** The old man had one rule in life: never trust anyone who doesn't smile. (*Correct use of the colon.*)

**List**: The colon introduces the list of options.

"She had a message for him: 'Don't come back.'"

**Quotation**: The colon introduces the direct speech or quotation.

"The storm was coming: dark clouds gathered, and the wind picked up."

**Explanation**: The colon introduces an elaboration or explanation of what "the storm was coming" means.

"He didn't need much to be happy: a book, a cup of tea, and peace."

**List**: The colon introduces a list of things he needs to be happy.
