The goal is to make sure the manuscript follows the rules of language and style, while maintaining clarity and precision.	A proofread is the final step before publication. It focuses on catching any remaining errors or typos in the manuscript. This service is <i>not</i> concerned with content or structure; it's about ensuring the text is error-free and polished.	A mini line edit is a more focused version of a line edit, typically aimed at a smaller portion of the manuscript (e.g., a few chapters or a section of the manuscript). It focuses on refining specific sections or scenes for clarity and flow.
